ZONING AMENDMENT – NONCONFORMING LOTS AND PARCELS – FIRST READING

A motion was made by Council Member Fuhrman, seconded by Council Member Nowak, to introduce the following for first reading:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE 3, SECTION 32-48, OF THE CITY OF ROGERS CITY ZONING ORDINANCE (ORDINANCE 2011-1, AS AMENDED) BY DELETING PARAGRAPH 2 OF SUBSECTION E WHICH PROHIBITS AN OWNER FROM DIVIDING CONTIGUOUS LOTS, PARCELS, OR PARTS THEREOF IF DOING SO WOULD DIMINISH COMPLIANCE WITH LOT WIDTH, DEPTH, AND/OR AREA REQUIREMENTS ESTABLISHED BY THE ORDINANCE OR WHICH CREATES A NONCONFORMING STRUCTURE.

THE CITY OF ROGERS CITY ORDAINS:

Section 1. Article 3 (General Provisions), Section 32-48 (Non-conforming Structures, Uses, and Lots), Subsection E (Nonconforming Lots or Parcels) is amended as follows (language in green is added; language in red, with strikethrough, is eliminated):

E. NONCONFORMING LOTS OR PARCELS:

- 1. Any nonconforming lot of record may be used for any purpose authorized by the district in which it is located. This provision shall apply even though such lot fails to meet the requirements for area or width applicable in the district, provided that yard dimensions and other requirements not involving area or width, or both, of the lot shall conform to the regulations for the district in which such lot is located. In the case of a nonconforming lot, the Zoning Officer may grant an administrative deviation to the provisions of this Ordinance in an amount not to exceed a twenty (20) percent variation from the site development standards contained in this Ordinance. The Zoning Officer may request decision on such deviations be deferred to the Zoning Board of Appeals. Any required variances may be requested pursuant to the procedures and standards of this Ordinance. (⁴⁶Amended by Ordinance 2018-11)
- 2. If two (2) or more contiguous lots, parcels, or portions of lots or parcels are under the same ownership and do not individually meet the lot width, depth, and/or area requirements of this Ordinance, then those contiguous lots, parcels, or portions of lots or parcels shall be considered an undivided lot or parcel for the purposes of this Ordinance, and <u>no</u> portion of such undivided lot or parcel shall be used or divided in a manner that diminishes compliance with the lot width, depth, and/or area requirements established by this Ordinance or which creates a nonconforming structure.

Section 2. If any clause, sentence, paragraph or part of this Ordinance shall for any reason be finally adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment is rendered.

Section 3. The City of Rogers City Zoning Ordinance, except as herein or heretofore amended, shall remain in full force and effect. The amendments provided herein shall not abrogate or affect any offense or act committed or done, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any pending fee, assessments, litigation, or prosecution of any right established, occurring prior to the effective date hereof.

Section 4. A summary of the provisions of this ordinance shall be published within fifteen (15) days of adoption.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect upon the expiration of seven days after the publication of a summary of its provisions.

ZONING AMENDMENT – COMMERCIAL USES IN RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS – FIRST READING

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE 21, SECTION 32-260, OF THE CITY OF ROGERS CITY ZONING ORDINANCE (ORDINANCE 2011-1, AS AMENDED) BY ELIMINATING RESTAURANTS AS A PROHIBITED USE IN ALL R-2 DISTRICTS AND RESTRICTING RETAIL, SERVICE, COMMERCIAL, AND OFFICE USES TO A SPECIFIC R-2 DISTRICT ILLUSTRATED IN A NEW OVERLAY MAP

THE CITY OF ROGERS CITY ORDAINS:

Section 1. Article 21 (Supplemental Development Regulations), Section 32-260 (Commercial/Office Use in a Residential District), Subsection B (Uses), Number 4 (Prohibited Uses) is amended as follows (language in green is added; language in red, with strikethrough, is eliminated):

4. PROHIBITED USES: Activities specifically prohibited include: Animal grooming, kennels, restaurants, repair or service of motor vehicles and other large equipment; manufacturing processes which would normally require industrial zoning; any activity which may become a nuisance due to noise, unsightliness, or odor; and any activity which may adversely affect surrounding property.

Section 2. Article 21 (Supplemental Development Regulations), Section 32-260 (Commercial/Office Use in a Residential District), Subsection C (Conditions) is amended by adding Number 11, which creates an overlay map within which neighborhood retail, service, commercial, and office use are permitted in R-2 districts as follows (language in green is added; language in red, with strikethrough, is eliminated):

11. Neighborhood retail, service, commercial, and office use may only be located within the area of the Residential District Overlay designated in the following map:



Section 3. If any clause, sentence, paragraph or part of this Ordinance shall for any reason be finally adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment is rendered.

Section 4. The City of Rogers City Zoning Ordinance, except as herein or heretofore amended, shall remain in full force and effect. The amendments provided herein shall not abrogate or affect any offense or act committed or done, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any pending fee, assessments, litigation, or prosecution of any right established, occurring prior to the effective date hereof.

Section 2. If any clause, sentence, paragraph or part of this Ordinance shall for any reason be finally adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment is rendered.

Section 3. The City of Rogers City Zoning Ordinance, except as herein or heretofore amended, shall remain in full force and effect. E. NONCONFORMING LOTS OR PARCELS:

- 1. Any nonconforming lot of record may be used for any purpose authorized by the district in which it is located. This provision shall apply even though such lot fails to meet the requirements for area or width applicable in the district, provided that yard dimensions and other requirements not involving area or width, or both, of the lot shall conform to the regulations for the district in which such lot is located. In the case of a nonconforming lot, the Zoning Officer may grant an administrative deviation to the provisions of this Ordinance in an amount not to exceed a twenty (20) percent variation from the site development standards contained in this Ordinance. The Zoning Officer may request decision on such deviations be deferred to the Zoning Board of Appeals. Any required variances may be requested pursuant to the procedures and standards of this Ordinance. (⁴⁶Amended by Ordinance 2018-11)
- 2. If two (2) or more contiguous lots, parcels, or portions of lots or parcels are under the same ownership and do not individually meet the lot width, depth, and/or area requirements of this Ordinance, then those contiguous lots, parcels, or portions of lots or parcels shall be considered an undivided lot or parcel for the purposes of this Ordinance, and <u>no</u> portion of such undivided lot or parcel shall be used or divided in a manner that diminishes compliance with the lot width, depth, and/or area requirements established by this Ordinance or which creates a nonconforming structure.

Section 2. If any clause, sentence, paragraph or part of this Ordinance shall for any reason be finally adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment is rendered.

Section 3. The City of Rogers City Zoning Ordinance, except as herein or heretofore amended, shall remain in full force and effect. The amendments provided herein shall not abrogate or affect any offense or act committed or done, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any pending fee, assessments, litigation, or prosecution of any right established, occurring prior to the effective date hereof.

which would normally require industrial zoning; any activity which may become a nuisance due to noise, unsightliness, or odor; and any activity which may adversely affect surrounding property.

Section 2. Article 21 (Supplemental Development Regulations), Section 32-260 (Commercial/Office Use in a Residential District), Subsection C (Conditions) is amended by adding Number 11, which creates an overlay map within which neighborhood retail, service, commercial, and office use are permitted in R-2 districts as follows (language in green is added; language in red, with strikethrough, is eliminated):

11. Neighborhood retail, service, commercial, and office use may only be located within the area of the Residential District Overlay designated in the following map:
